Human Rights Act Implications

Licensing Act 2003

A licensing authority must carry out its function under the Licensing Act 2003 with a view of promoting the licensing objectives.

The Licensing objectives are:-

- (a) the prevention of crime and disorder;
- (b) public safety;
- (c) the prevention of public nuisance; and
- (d) the protection of children from harm.

In carrying out its licensing functions a licensing authority must also have regard to:-

(a) its licensing statement published under Section 5 of the Licensing Act 2003 (this may be viewed on the Mid Sussex District Council website);

and

(b) any guidance issued by the Secretary of State under Section 182 of the Licensing Act (this may be viewed on the Department for Culture, Media and Sport website).

Members are asked to consider the human rights implications for both the licensee who has rights under Article 1 of the First Protocol, the Right to Property (which includes the licence):and the objectors who have rights under Article 8 to Respect for Private and Family Life, and Article 1 of the First Protocol, their right to enjoy peaceful use of their possessions.

Purpose of Report

1 To provide information in order that the Licensing Committee can determine an application for a Premises Licence.

Summary

- 2 An application, pursuant to Section 17 Licensing Act 2003, has been made by Bluebell Railway PLC for the grant of a Premises Licence at Horsted Keynes Railway Station, Station Approach, Horsted Keynes, RH17 7BB. The Environmental Health Team, a Responsible Authority and six members of the public, referred to as 'Interested Parties' within the Act, have submitted representations objecting to the application on the grounds of the Prevention of Public Nuisance.
- 3 It should be noted by the Panel that there is a Premises Licence currently issued in respect of the premises. This current application is for the issue of a new Premises Licence as the Bluebell Railway wish to extend the licensable area included in the Premises Licence and also to provide more flexibility in respect of the number of large events that they will be able to hold at the location. This not a review or consideration of the current licence.
- 4 The Committee is asked to determine the application in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003, MSDC Licensing Policy and the Home Office Guidance issued under Section 182 Licensing Act 2003, whilst having due regard to the applicant's submissions and relevant representations.

Background

- 5 The Bluebell Railway is a Heritage Railway visitor attraction running through the High Weald. The Bluebell Railway Preservation Society, and thus its Trustees and members, own a majority shareholding in the Railway, a not-forprofit company. Bluebell Railway holds an existing premises license. This new application seeks to provide further flexibility around public events and day to day running by extending the licensed footprint.
- 6 The existing Premises Licence (PWA0014) licenses the Refreshment Rooms situated on the platform together with additional areas identified as the Railway Field and Paddock. The new application proposes to extend the licensed area to include all the Platform areas, the carriage and wagon shed and the Car Park.

7 The current Premises Licence allows the following activities:

9 The proposed opening hours of the premises will be:

Mon - Sun 10:00 – 23:00

- 10 The application was correctly advertised at the site between 11th April 2022 to 8th May 2022 and in the Mid Sussex Times on 14th April 2022.
- 11 There have been representations made against this application which have been received from one of the Environmental Protection Team, a Responsible Authority. This representation concerns the Prevention of a Public Nuisance. The detail of this representation is appended to the report.

- 12 Five further representations have been received from members of the public, referred to as 'Interested Parties'. The main points raised in these representations that are relevant relate to the licensing objective of the Prevention of a Public Nuisance.
- 13 The Committee should be aware when reading the representations from the Interested Parties that some of the information contained therein is irrelevant for the purposes of the Licensing Act 2003. They are the comments relating to the provision of car parking, people driving to the location, disturbance to the local wildlife and livestock, noise from locomotives and tannoy announcements, the narrowness of access roads and additional visitor numbers to the location.
- 14 The Committee must focus on the relevant parts only and disregard the irrelevant matters when determining this matter
- 15 There were two further representations made from Interested Parties that are not considered to be relevant under the Licensing Act 2003.
- 16 The Police have agreed conditions with the applicants in respect of the application.
- 17 If the Committee decides to grant the licence, I request that a number of conditions offered in the operating schedule and agreed by the Police be attached. Full details are attached in the appendices.

Representations

Responsible Authority Representations

18 Representations the Environmental Protection Team.

Objections have been received on the grounds of Prevention of a Public Nuisance

The applicant seeks to license the whole premises to allow various events every day between 08:00 and 23:00. Given the very quiet rural location of this venue and that noise complaints have been received regarding previous events, Environmental Protection has concern that outdoor events involving amplified music and sound such as plays, dance performances, drive in movies, live bands and recorded music provided at celebrations such as weddings, will cause disturbance to people living in the vicinity of the railway.

Environmental Protection can resolve this representation if an agreement can be reached with the applicant concerning the maximum number of days per year on which events will be held. In addition, Environmental Protection would require a condition be included on the licence requiring the applicant to submit a suitable Noise Management Plan to the Licensing team for approval by Environmental Protection before the first event is held under the new licence.

Interested Parties Representations

Peter Clarke

Mr Clarke has made objections on the grounds of the Prevention of a Public Nuisance.

He has stated that:

The application seeks to extend "further licensing flexibility" to the Bluebell Railway when planning events at Horsted Keynes Station. As a resident of Railway Cottages, which are in the middle of the areas for which permission is sought, I have very serious concerns about the public nuisance and safety of the scope of this application and object to it in its current form.

The application seeks permission to play music indoors and outdoors in every area of the station from 0800am until 1100pm 7 days a week all year round. This is totally unacceptable. The cottages are directly opposite area no 5. "Railway field" and adjacent to no 8. "Paddock" show on the map attached to the application. There is no way any indoor or outdoor event (wedding, film, dance, theatre production) playing music in these areas will not impact the lives of the residents. We could potentially have to listen to it all day every weekend or even all day on week days in the holidays.

Furthermore, live music is limited to 18 "events" per year. One event could cover the 3 weeks of Christmas Carole's and music on the platform which lead up to Christmas. Another event could conceivably cover an entire weekend music festival or theatre production. As such 18 events could actually cover many weeks of live music activity.

Adam Hackett

Mr Hackett has made objections on the grounds of the Prevention of a Public Nuisance.

He has stated:

Events in the past 5 years at Bluebell Railway under special licenses have produced excessive and widespread noise

The application is for a wide area which covers the entire Bluebell Railway buildings at Horsted Keynes Station , nearby field and car parks . This is a huge platform for generating greater noise and disturbance

A license to 23.00 on every or any day is unacceptable . To allow it at 18 Live Events per year with music and bands is excessive and a nuisance and disturbance of our peace

Camilla Witheridge

Camila Witheridge has made objections on the grounds of the Prevention of a Public Nuisance.

She has stated:

The Bluebell events are and will be a public nuisance because of the noise they generate. During the events staged by the Bluebell railway in summer 2021 we could hear revellers, loud music, announcements and general noise.

The bands were playing music in the open air with amplifiers and no sound proofing. The music was audible inside our house.... The acoustics of the valley that the Horsted Keynes Railway station is situated in does not lend itself to the dissipation of sound. Horsted House is 700m away but the sound is clearly audible. Our garden is filled with noise and you cannot get away from it unless you go inside and close the windows. It would not be so bad if these events happened in the winter but in the summer it makes it difficult to get to sleep.

If you extend the license, there will not be a single Saturday to enjoy the peace because 18 days would license the Bluebell Railway to disturb every weekend all summer (18 days equals four Saturdays a month for three and a half months, ie. from end May till mid September)

Damien Poole

Mr Poole has made objections on the grounds of the Prevention of a Public Nuisance.

He has stated:

The increased area of this application includes a Paddock immediately adjacent to 6 residential cottages. They have previously held weddings and events here. The noise and disruption to residents has indeed constituted a public nuisance in the past.

The events involve loud music which penetrates the cottages and the increased frequency of these events and closer proximity will simply cause even more public nuisance by way of noise pollution. On a weekend band event, held in the field opposite the station about a year ago, the noise disturbed people over a mile away.

This application, however, takes things to a whole new level of disruption, anxiety, and stress. The weddings and concerts that they want to hold in the fields and paddock will seriously and detrimentally affect our quality of life and health. Previous concerts and weddings have produced an unbearable level of noise pollution which penetrates all of the cottages.

Jake McQuitty

Mr McQuitty has made objections on the grounds of the Prevention of a Public Nuisance.

He has stated:

In short, we object to any licence that results in an excessive number of events at the station and environs, and which are liable to run late into the night with live bands and crowds of people creating significant noise that can be heard from our house. Our children will be kept awake for a start but more importantly this would constitute a public nuisance

Rufus Clarke

Rufus Clarke has made representations on behalf of himself, Bunty Clarke, Rory Clarke and Harriet Clarke. Separate representations have not been made by each party.

He has stated:

Noise emanating from the premises as has been experienced from previous events held at this location. This has resulted in our family being unable to sit outside or have windows open in the summer months. Previous events have resulted in loud music and excessive noise from attendees at the event, which has caused disturbance for an entire weekend and as such has caused a public nuisance. The likely effect of granting a new licence will be increased disturbance and restrictions to our peace during afternoons and evenings, when we would be keen to be outside in the garden. Keeping our windows open has been problematic during these events as the sound has affected our children when trying to sleep.

Policy Context

19 Determination of Application for a Premises Licence

The Committee must determine the application in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (LA03), MSDC Licensing Policy and the Home Office Guidance issued under Section 182 Licensing Act 2003, whilst having due regard to the applicant's submissions and relevant representations.

20 Section 18 LA03 deals with the determination of the application:

Grant of premises licence

18. Determination of application for premises licence

(1) This section applies where the relevant licensing authority-

(a) receives an application for a premises licence made in accordance with section 17, and

(b) is satisfied that the applicant has complied with any requirement imposed on him under subsection (5) of that section.

(2) Subject to subsection (3), the authority must grant the licence in accordance with the application subject only to—

(a) such conditions as are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, and

(b)any conditions which must under section 19, 20 or 21 be included in the licence.

- (3) Where relevant representations are made, the authority must-
- (a) hold a hearing to consider them, unless the authority, the applicant and each person who has made such representations agree that a hearing is unnecessary, and

(b) having regard to the representations, take such of the steps mentioned in subsection (4) (if any) as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

(4) The steps are—

(a) to grant the licence subject to-

(i) the conditions mentioned in subsection (2)(a) modified to such extent as the authority considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and

(ii) any condition which must under section 19, 20 or 21 be included in the licence;

(b) to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;

(c) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;

(d) to reject the application.

(5) For the purposes of subsection (4)(a)(i) the conditions mentioned in subsection (2)(a) are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added.

(6) For the purposes of this section, "relevant representations" means representations which—

(a) are about the likely effect of the grant of the premises licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives,

(b) meet the requirements of subsection (7),

(c) if they relate to the identity of the person named in the application as the proposed premises supervisor, meet the requirements of subsection (9), and

(d) are not excluded representations by virtue of section 32 (restriction on making representations following issue of provisional statement).

(7) The requirements of this subsection are—

(a) that the representations were made by a responsible authority or other person within the period prescribed under section 17(5)(c),

(b) that they have not been withdrawn, and

(c) in the case of representations made by a person who is not a responsible authority, that they are not, in the opinion of the relevant licensing authority, frivolous or vexatious.

21 Relevant Representations

The Licensing Act 2003 requires representations to address the four licensing Objectives which are

- 1. Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- 2. Promotion of Public Safety
- 3. Prevention of Public Nuisance
- 4. Prevention of Harm to children and young persons
- 22 A representation is a 'relevant representation' if it is about the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives. The objector must establish that such a consequence is a *likely* effect of a grant (ie more probable than not)
- 23 Guidance Issued Under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003

9.3

Where a representation concerning the licensing objectives is made by a responsible authority about a proposed operating schedule and it is relevant, the licensing authority's discretion will be engaged. It will also be engaged if another person makes relevant representations to the licensing authority, which are also not frivolous or vexatious. Relevant representations can be made in opposition to, or in support of, an application and can be made by any individual, body or business that has grounds to do so.

9.4

A representation is "relevant" if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives. For example, a representation from a local businessperson about the commercial damage caused by competition from new licensed premises would not be relevant. On the other hand, a representation by a businessperson that nuisance caused by new premises would deter customers from entering the local area, and the steps proposed by the applicant to prevent that nuisance were inadequate, would be relevant. In other words, representations should relate to the impact of licensable activities carried on from premises on the objectives.

9.37

As a matter of practice, licensing authorities should seek to focus the hearing on the steps considered appropriate to promote the particular licensing objective or objectives that have given rise to the specific representation and avoid straying into undisputed areas. A responsible authority or other person may choose to rely on their written representation. They may not add further representations to those disclosed to the applicant prior to the hearing, but they may expand on their existing representation and should be allowed sufficient time to do so, within reasonable and practicable limits.

9.38

In determining the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community, the licensing authority must give appropriate weight to:

- the steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives;
- the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties;
- Guidance issued under Section 182 Licensing Act 2003;
- its own statement of licensing policy.

9.42

Licensing authorities are best placed to determine what actions are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in their areas. All licensing determinations should be considered on a case-by-case basis. They should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or premises user as the case may be.

9.43

The authority's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve.

Other Options Considered

24 In order to lawfully provide licensable activities as applied for, they must be conducted under the authority of a Premises Licence.

Financial Implications

25 The final decision made by the Committee in this matter is subject to appeal in the Magistrates Court by any party to the proceedings.

Other Material Implications

- 28 Section 136 Licensing Act 2003 A person commits an offence if he carries on or attempts to carry a licensable activity on or from any premises otherwise, than under and in accordance with an authorisation or he knowingly allows a licensable activity to be so carried on.
- 29 A person guilty of an offence under this section is liable on summary conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or to a fine or both.



Bluebell Railway, Horsted Keynes Station, Station Approach, Horsted Keynes. Haywards Heath. West Sussex. RH17 7BB

I write on behalf of Mid Sussex District Council Environmental Protection to raise a representation against the grant of the above application on the grounds of the licensing objective of the prevention of a public nuisance.

The applicant seeks to license the whole premises to allow various events every day between 08:00 and 23:00. Given the very quiet rural location of this venue and that noise complaints have been received regarding previous events, Environmental Protection has concerns that outdoor events involving amplified music and sound such as plays, dance performances, drive in movies, live bands and recorded music provided at celebrations such as weddings, will cause disturbance to people living in the vicinity of the railway.

Environmental Protection therefore objects to this application.

Environmental Protection can resolve this representation if an agreement can be reached with the applicant concerning the maximum number of days per year on which events will be held. In addition, Environmental Protection would require a condition be included on the licence requiring the applicant to submit a suitable Noise Management Plan to the Licensing team for approval by Environmental Protection before the first event is held under the new licence.

Thank you for your email.

Although I appreciate your comments and the feeling behind them, issues surrounding parking and vehicular access etc are not considered to be part of the licensing objective relating to public safety.

Examples of matters that can be considered in relation to public safety may include:

- Fire safety;
- Good communication with local authorities and emergency services, for example communications networks with the police and signing up for local incident alerts;
- Ensuring the presence of trained first aiders on the premises and appropriate first aid kits;
- Ensuring the safety of people when leaving the premises (for example, through the provision of information on late-night transportation);
- Ensuring appropriate and frequent waste disposal, particularly of glass bottles;
- Ensuring appropriate limits on the maximum capacity of the premises
- Considering the use of CCTV in and around the premises.

As much as I would want to I can only accept relevant representations that fall within the Legislation and Statutory Guidance.

If the representations are not resolved then the application will be determined by the Licensing Panel, they will have possession of your full emails but can only take account of relevant representations in respect of their decision.

Thank you for your email. I respectfully request that my objection be considered in full, not just the issue of noise, as they represent relevant considerations of considerable public safety and public nuisance.

The issue of vehicle traffic and lack of parking facilities is one of one of public safety for the following reasons:-

My neighbours (who are still members of the public) and I are entitled to be able to step outside of our front gates without the risk of being hit by speeding vehicles as detailed in the incidents in my objection.

Members of the public parking their cars along the edge of a single lane track are at significantly greater risk of being hit by another vehicle on getting out of and in to their vehicles than when parked correctly in a car park.

The historical poor organisation of the events held in the past at the station has directly contributed to a public nuisance especially to the Bluebell's immediate neighbours. A relaxing of the licensing governing these events will inevitably lead to a greater incidence of events and a commensurate increase in public nuisance. My example of the music festival last year is a case in point. It was a one off event that was a considerable nuisance which was heard miles away and which now has the potential to be a weekly event. Therefore the Bluebells competence in

managing such events is relevant.

In respect of Licensing Applications I can only take into account "relevant representations". Some of the issues that you have raised may be considered in other types of applications; however, in Licensing Applications a representation is only "relevant" if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the Licensing Objectives. I am not permitted to accept any representations that are not considered to be relevant under the Act.

As stated, to be relevant representations must relate to one or more of the four licensing objectives of crime prevention, public safety, public nuisance and child protection and must be about the likely effect of granting the licence, on the promotion of at least one of the four licensing objectives. The four licensing objectives are:

1. The prevention of crime and disorder. This relates to any crime, disorder or anti-social behaviour at the premises or related to the management of the premises. A licence holder/applicant cannot generally be held responsible for the conduct of individuals once they leave the premises;

Public safety. This relates to the safety of the public on the premises, i.e. fire safety, electrical circuitry, lighting, building safety or capacity, and first aid.
 Prevention of public nuisance. This can relate to issues such as hours of operation, noise emanating from the premises, vibrations, lighting and litter.
 Protection of children from harm. This relates to protecting children from the activities carried out on the premises whilst they are there. The law already provides special protections for children under 18 to buy alcohol.

Unlike Planning consultations, comments and representations cannot be considered if they relate to anything else. Your specific comments surrounding access to the site, parking provision at events and other issues such as planning permission, the need for the premises, trade competition, the effect on house prices etc are not relevant in the context of a Licensing Application. In other words, representations should relate to the impact of licensable activities carried on from premises on the objectives. You need to give as much detail as possible so that the Licensing Authority can assess the relevance of your representation

You are aware that there is a Premises Licence currently granted at Horsted Keynes Railway Station which does allow for the sale of alcohol and also regulated entertainment. I am writing regarding the above application which I have only now been made

aware of despite it being submitted in early April. I am not aware of any notice visible in the area of the Station.

The application seeks to extend "further licensing flexibility" to the Bluebell Railway when planning events at Horsted Keynes Station. As a resident of Railway Cottages, which are in the middle of the areas for which permission is sought, I have very serious concerns about the public nuisance and safety of the scope of this application and object to it in its current form.

The application seeks permission to play music indoors and outdoors in every area of the station from 0800am until 1100pm 7 days a week all year round. This is totally unacceptable. The cottages are directly opposite area no 5. "Railway field" and adjacent to no 8. "Paddock" show on the map attached to the application. There is no way any indoor or outdoor event (wedding, film, dance, theatre production) playing music in these ares will not impact the lives of the residents. We could potentially have to listen to it all day every weekend or even all day on week days in the holidays.

Furthermore, live music is limited to 18 "events" per year. One event could cover the 3 weeks of Christmas Carole's and music on the platform which lead up to Christmas. Another event could conceivably cover an entire weekend music festival or theatre production. As such 18 events could actually cover many weeks of live music activity.

The cottages are already impacted by noise pollution from the Ravenswood wedding venue which play music all year round and existing Bluebell events. At a Bluebell music festival weekend event last year the music was ridiculously loud for the tiny crowd in attendance and showed no consideration for the people who live here. It was only turned down when a complaint was made to the council.

The Bluebell have proven themselves over the past 20 years to be very poor at managing public events at the Station. A lack of planning and coordination, staffing and basic organisation have meant events have unnecessarily negatively impacted the lives of the Cottage residents.

There is insufficient parking for Bluebell visitors in the public car park and in wet weather visitors cannot park on the grass field. As a result visitors park along the access road to the cottages which impedes our access and is specifically prohibited in the deeds for the use of the road. The Bluebell's 3rd party traffic marshals are either not made aware of the requirement to keep the road clear or choose to ignore it as they have no where else to park cars.

Vehicles access the paddock (area no 8) for events is via a grass track directly in front of the cottages. Once again, in the past, contractors have shown no consideration for the safety or well being of the residents or their visitors and it has fallen to the residents themselves to try and control the vehicles speeds. No consideration is taken of the forecast weather with vehicles in the past becoming stuck in the mud outside the cottages after heavy rain.

Overall, the Bluebell have shown a serious lack of consideration for the concerns and welfare of its neighbours when conducting public events at the Station in the past. These poorly managed events have negatively impacted our lives. This gives me very serious reservations about granting them greater flexibility in the future licensing of events. I therefore request that the application be denied in its current form until more safeguards are put in place for its immediate neighbours.

Thank you for your further representation.

Having carefully read through it I can confirm that there are matters that you raise that are relevant in respect of Licensing Applications.

Firstly, to clarify, the application is for a new Premises Licence, not a variation of the current one. The current licence is unaffected by this application and is not under consideration, however if the new application is successful then the old licence will be surrendered so there are not two running at the same time.

Your comments in respect of public nuisance are accepted as relevant in so far as they apply to the music events. Tannoy announcements and noise from trains are not regulated entertainment and therefore cannot be considered.

I can accept you comments in respect of the acoustics of the area and the potential consequences of the grant of the new licence.

Your comments surrounding disorder and public safety are not relevant. Unfortunately these comments do not have substance and are assumptions and there is no evidence to support this would be the likely effect of the grant of this new licence.

The comments around Public Safety are again not relevant in respect of licensing applications. Increase in traffic and the type of roads to the venue are not relevant in Licensing Applications.

I appreciate that there are a number of issues that cause concern to both yourself

and nearby residents and that there is a strength of feeling in respect of this application and there are issues that you raise that could be considered in other applications but in respect of Licensing Applications my discretion is limited by the Legislation and Statutory Guidance as to what can be accepted.

However as stated above I do accept your comments surrounding the potential for excessive noise from the venue causing disturbance due to the requested increase in events.

I will pass your comments onto the applicant to seek their response to see if they can modify their application or offer conditions which may satisfy your representation. If the representations are not resolved then the application will be determined by the Licensing Panel, they will have possession of your emails and correspondence but can only take account of relevant parts of the representations in respect of their decision.

Dear Sir,

Please do not extend the Bluebell Railway license so that they can increase the capacity and frequency of their events.

The Bluebell events are and will be a public nuisance because of the noise they generate. During the events staged by the Bluebell railway in summer 2021 we could hear revellers, loud music, announcements and general noise.

- 1. The bands were playing music in the open air with amplifiers and no sound proofing. The music was audible inside our house.
- 2. The compere was shouting into the microphone. You could hear individual words. I heard him say "we are in the middle of f****** nowhere". Which is a problem because it is not true.
- 3. The diesel driving tasters included the freedom for members of the public to honk the horns on the locomotives all day.
- 4. There were non-stop platform announcements.

The acoustics of the valley that the Horsted Keynes Railway station is situated in does not lend itself to the dissipation of sound. Horsted House is 700m away but the sound is clearly audible. Our garden is filled with noise and you cannot get away from it unless you go inside and close the windows. It would not be so bad if these events happened in the winter but in the summer it makes it difficult to get to sleep.

If you extend the license, there will not be a single Saturday to enjoy the peace because 18 days would license the Bluebell Railway to disturb every weekend all summer (18 days equals four Saturdays a month for three and a half months, ie. from end May till mid September)

The Bluebell events will lead to disorder locally. Hosting such a large number of people will lead to trespass, litter and damage to property. We border the Bluebell Railway site to the North and West and own the adjacent woods and fields. There is no boundary fence. They are likely to trespass and leave litter. They and their dogs are likely to distress our sheep and pheasants and the wild life.

The lighting the Bluebell will have to install on site to make the events safe will also be a public nuisance to us as it is visible from our house.

The Bluebell events will reduce public safety. Horsted Lane, Station Approach and roads in the area are narrow, with sharp bends and have no verge or street lighting. They are already dangerous as they are used by horse riders, farm traffic and heavy construction vehicles that use it as a short cut. Adding additional traffic would be dangerous.

The current license should be revoked not extended. In 2021, I wrote to the council to complain about the Horstedfest held on 6/7 August 2021. I also telephoned and complained about the private events hosted for the benefactors of the Bluebell railway.

The Bluebell Railway managers and employees show contempt to their neighbours when approached on the subject of noise. When I went to the station to ask them to stop honking the horn I was told by the staff on the platform that I was mistaken that there was no honking sound coming from the station. They only looked shame faced when the honking noise resumed while I was standing there in front of them. I do not trust them to take our welfare into consideration. It feels as though we are second class citizens to be steam rolled over.

I can confirm my previous examples were relevant representations aimed at highlighting the likely affect the approval of this application would cause to increase public nuisance.

The increased area of this application includes a Paddock immediately adjacent to 6 residential cottages.

They have previously held weddings and events here. The noise and disruption to residents has indeed constituted a public nuisance in the past.

The events involve loud music which penetrates the cottages and the increased frequency of these events and closer proximity will simply cause even more public nuisance by way of noise pollution. On a weekend band event, held in the field opposite the station about a year ago, the noise disturbed people over a mile away. The station tannoy already does this regularly. The affect is detrimental to the mental and physical health of the residents. Again, I would argue this constitutes a public nuisance.

I also object on the grounds of inevitable increase in crime and disorder. I know from nearly 30 years Police experience wedding venues frequently have to call the Police. For example the previous weddings held in the paddock involve some drunken people walking past the cottages causing harassment alarm and distress to the residents. This will only get worse.

Additionally, the remoteness of Horsted keynes means most visitors travel by car to events. The proposed increase in availability of alcohol will almost certainly increase the drink driving offences. I'd imagine the police would likely target the location for drink drive stop checks.

I understand that HK Bluebell Railway has applied for a licence to expand the scale and volume of its events at the railway station.

We live at xxx on Cinder Hill Lane and have a young family.

I would like to make you aware that we object to the company's request to expand its existing licence. Whilst the Bluebell Railway is a delightful sight and a wonderful community, it is not appropriate to turn it into the equivalent of a local party venue. We already have one of these on the other side of our house, at the Ravenswood Hotel, which generates significant amounts of noise on many a summer evening.

The HK station is easily audible from our property and while we are happy to tolerate the sound of steam engines puffing their way up the valley and the sound of the station master's tannoy during the day time it is another matter entirely for the station to host multiple public events in the evening throughout the summer, disrupting our hard-earned peace and solitude.

In short, we object to any licence that results in an excessive number of events at

the station and environs, and which are liable to run late into the night with live bands and crowds of people creating significant noise that can be heard from our house. Our children will be kept awake for a start but more importantly this would constitute a public nuisance. We are also concerned that the volume of traffic resulting from such events will have a detrimental impact on our peace - cars often drive down Cinder Hill Lane at speeds in excess of the legal limit, which makes considerable noise in its own right. If there are large numbers of attendees at events at the station then this is bound to result in large volumes of traffic heading home well after 23:00, travelling straight past the front of our house and creating additional noise.

In short, this is an entirely unacceptable application in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty that will have a materially detrimental impact on the enjoyment of our property and we hope the licensing committee will take appropriate steps to refuse or significantly restrict this proposal.

- Noise emanating from the premises as has been experienced from previous events held at this location. This has resulted in our family being unable to sit outside or have windows open in the summer months.
- Increased traffic down a narrow lane, poor access for large vehicles due to a low bridge (e.g. fire engines).
- A disturbance to livestock on our farm.

We sincerely hope that common sense will prevail and that extra, late events will not be permissible in an AONB, which currently create substantial noise, which travels clearly and antisocially through the valley.

Thank you for your email making representations in respect of the application by the Bluebell

Railway for a new Premises Licence at Horsted Keynes Station.

In respect of Licensing Applications I can only take into account "relevant representations". The issues that you have raised may be considered in other types of applications; however, in Licensing Applications a representation is only "relevant" if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the Licensing Objectives. I am not permitted to accept any representations that are not considered to be relevant under the Act.

As stated, to be relevant representations must relate to one or more of the four licensing objectives of crime prevention, public safety, public nuisance and child protection and <u>must</u> be about the likely effect of granting the licence, on the promotion of at least one of the four licensing objectives. The four licensing objectives are:

- The prevention of crime and disorder. This relates to any crime, disorder or anti-social behaviour at the premises or related to the management of the premises. A licence holder/applicant cannot generally be held responsible for the conduct of individuals once they leave the premises;
- 2. Public safety. This relates to the safety of the public on the premises, i.e. fire safety, electrical circuitry, lighting, building safety or capacity, and first aid.
- 3. Prevention of public nuisance. This can relate to issues such as hours of operation, noise emanating from the premises, vibrations, lighting and litter.
- 4. Protection of children from harm. This relates to protecting children from the activities carried out on the premises whilst they are there. The law already provides special protections for children under 18 to buy alcohol.

Unlike Planning consultations, comments and representations cannot be considered if they relate to anything else, such as planning permission, the need for the premises, trade competition, the effect on house prices, parking etc. In other words, representations should relate to the impact of licensable activities carried on from premises on the objectives. You need to give as much detail as possible so that the Licensing Authority can assess the relevance of your representation

You may be aware that there is a Premises Licence currently granted at Horsted Keynes Railway Station which does allow for the sale of alcohol and also regulated entertainment. You will see from the new application that the new Premises Licence being applied for is to expand the current licensable area and increase the number of times events could potentially be held in the car park/adjacent field.

The general points that you raise would not be considered relevant under the four licensing objectives, however the issue that you mention concerning 'increased noise from the Bluebell' potentially could amount to a relevant representation under the licensing objective of the Prevention of a Public Nuisance which does include a public nuisance caused by excessive noise.

Are you able to confirm that this comment is in relation to this objective and can you provide further information and details about the likely effect of the grant of the new licence in this respect to support your representation.

If a relevant representation is made and it cannot be resolved then the application will be

determined by the Licensing Sub Committee. All parties who have submitted a representation will be able to address the Sub-Committee. No new grounds of objection may be raised or introduced at this stage and parties are limited to speaking to matters outlined in their original representation although detail provided may be expanded upon.

Unfortunately, currently, I am unable to accept your email as a valid representation, however I look forward to receiving any further information you may have in support of your representation.

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Proposed Conditions

Conditions agreed with Police

1. The premises shall at all times maintain and operate a sales refusals log and an incident log will be kept to record all refusals and incidents of crime or disorder. These shall be reviewed and signed by the Designated Premises Supervisor at intervals of no more than eight (8) weeks. Feedback shall be given to staff to ensure these are used on each occasion that a refusal or incident occurs at the premises. These records shall be kept for a minimum of twenty four (24) months, and made immediately available upon request to the Local Authority Licensing Officers and Sussex Police Officers or Licensing staff.

2. If a third party is to use the premises for a music event (with more than 500 attendees given that music isn't a regulated activity under 500 attendees between 8am-11pm on licensed premises) the Licensing Authority and Police are to be informed no later than 12 weeks prior to the event.

3. Event organisers shall produce an ESMP (event safety management plan) and conduct a risk assessment acceptable to the Police and licensing Authority in relation to all events in relation to public safety and made immediately available upon request to the Local Authority and Sussex Police.

4. On occasions when a requirement is identified by the licence holder's risk assessment or requested by Sussex Police, glass vessels shall not be used in any area of the premises open to the public.

5. SIA trained and licensed door supervisors shall be employed on occasions when a requirement is identified by the licence holder's risk assessment or requested by Sussex Police.

6. All staff must be made aware of proxy sales and be vigilant to adults purchasing and providing alcohol to children.

Conditions requested by Environmental Protection Team

A condition on the licence limiting the number of **days** on which events can take place to 12 each year and would expect strict noise control measures for events providing amplified sound.

A condition that for each **type** of planned event providing amplified sound, the Bluebell Railway will submit a Noise Management Plan for approval by EP before the first event is allowed to take place. EP feel that this is necessary given the sensitive nature of the locality and that the applicant has applied for various types of events without giving sufficient information regarding how each will be set up and managed to prevent public nuisance. The applicant should be aware that EP are unlikely to approve any NMP unless the railway can show that they will comply with current guidance to control noise, and this may require them to seek input from a suitably qualified acoustician.

EP would also require a condition that any NMPs be reviewed should the Council receive noise complaints.

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
